2014 Cypress Isles Quarterlies up 1%

Proposed aerator is not a factor.

On September 17^{th} the Cypress Isles board of directors approved a \$28,840 operating budget for 2014, increasing quarterly fees by 50¢ to \$51.50 per quarter. The proposed pond aerator does not affect the budget because it is solar-powered and the purchase price is expected to come from reserve accounts. The complete budget is listed separately under "Cypress Isles 2014 Budget."

Use separate coupons for WLCA and Cypress Isles. Each homeowner should receive two payment coupon books during December – one for Cypress Isles and the other for WLCA. Each payment (with its coupon) goes to a different address.

Pay quarterly or all at once. In both cases, you can either pay the first payment by January 1, or you can pay off the entire year at once and get it over with.

Financials available in January. Copies of the 2013 Financials will be available to all Cypress Isles homeowners after January 20, 2014. Just contact Bob Borg at bborg@community-mgmt.com or 407-455-5917 after January 20th.

Alien Attack Halted by Cypress Isles Resident

Most of us didn't notice or didn't care. But one alert resident reacted to the dangers.

Their ships landed about 200 years ago, and at first everyone thought they were cute and harmless. We thought we could coexist with them, but while we enjoyed their company, they made room for their ever-increasing population by continually conquering our properties. This is the attack of the Brazilian Peppers.

Brought to Florida in the mid-1800s, Brazilian Peppers are native to Argentina, Paraguay and Brazil, where their natural enemies keep them in check. But up here they are unopposed and populate out of control, like the pythons in the Everglades.

Brazilian Peppers produce a dense canopy that shades out all other plants and provides a very poor habitat for native species. They invade aquatic as well as terrestrial habitats, greatly reducing the quantity of native plants, so the Florida Exotic Pest Plant Council listed them as an invasive species.

In Cypress Isles the peppers have taken over parts of our green belt and common areas. This "growing" menace however did not escape the keen eye of Cypress Isles resident and naturalist John Culbertson. Over the past year John has conducted a full frontal assault, cutting down and removing these invasive plants and destroying their root systems so they don't spring up again.

You may have noticed John or been approached by him to gain permission to cut and remove any Brazilian Pepper discovered in the wooded areas behind our homes. He's not just beating the bushes; he's taking back our lands.

We wish to thank Cypress Isles Resident John Culbertson for his tireless efforts (during the hottest part of the year no less) to remove Brazilian Pepper Trees and protect us from this Alien Invader.

No WLCA Fee Increase 2014

This is the third budget in six years with no increase.

WLCA will have the same \$163.00 quarterly fees as in 2013. General Manager Ken Zook and the newly formed Finance Committee were able to find enough sensible reductions in some areas to offset modest increases in other areas.

This is the third no-increase year in recent memory; the others were in 2008 and 2012.

Orange County 311-One Call For Almost Anything

Did you know Orange County has one of the bestkept secrets anywhere?

Orange County maintains a phone service where residents can call for assistance in many areas of service. These numbers are for landlines as well as cell phones (Carrier restrictions may be in place on some service providers). Orange County 311 is the point of contact for some of the following services:

- Animal Services including reporting animal bites, pet adoption, stray or injured and neglected domestic animals and making Spay and Neuter appointments.
- Code Enforcement including reporting graffiti, inoperable vehicles, lot cleaning, property in disrepair and trash, junk and debris concerns.
- Roads and Drainage including reporting potholes and tree branch hazards on public property.
- Traffic Engineering including reporting fallen stop signs and traffic light malfunctions
- Zoning including getting Garage Sale permits, fence permits and Land Zoning and Use issues.
- You can call 311 to get contact numbers for County officials, general government information, reporting dead animals on roadways and report mosquito problems.
- 311 is also the point of contact for disaster situations within unincorporated Orange County. Report flooding, blocked roads and sandbag requests.

The hours of operation for this service are: Monday – Friday 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. Saturday and Sunday 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
